LEICESTER TOWN & VILLAGE HISTORIAN 2021 ANNUAL REPORT

2021 Summary:

The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to limit activities. Conferences, public presentations, and events were cancelled or attended by ZOOM. Interactions with researchers and the public are by telephone or computer.

This year there have been new opportunities to enhance Leicester history. The SUNY Geneseo Center for Local and Municipal History obtained a grant to create a website-digital archives titled " The Indigenous History of Livingston County. I met with Professor Orberg and provided many documents concerning Native American history in the Town of Leicester.

The William G. Pomeroy Foundation Historic Transportation Canal Marker Program is a grant program to provide Historic Markers. The Genesee Valley Canal operated from 1840-1878 and two ports were located in the Town of Leicester. In May I submitted a Letter of Intent to apply for a Moscow Landing Historic Marker. In October I submitted a Letter of Intent to apply for a Historic Marker for Cuylerville Basin. The Pomeroy Foundation have very exacting and rigorous requirements for historic verification. Only primary source documents written at the time will qualify. The Town History files contained very little information about either site. I spent countless hours researching both online and local resources for documentation to meet the Pomeroy Foundation requirements. The Moscow Landing and Cuylerville Basin applications are still under review.

The Livingston County Walls Program will be creating an art mural for each village. I serve on the Leicester Committee and provide information about Leicester history.

The SUNY Geneseo History Department has obtained a grant to provide Interns next year. The Interns are paid by the grant and there would not be any cost to the Town of Leicester. I have requested an Intern to create a photographic Inventory of the Town of Leicester photographs.

The ongoing project to consolidate the Town obituary files is nearly complete. Requests for information as well as donations to the Historical files continue.
