Proposed Water Contract with Village: No Action, Changes will be presented to the Village regarding Water agreement. Section 4 Second paragraph Sublet A. And in Paragraph B. Section 5 Paragraph B. Town Board seeing these changes and would like time to review. Place on Next Tuesdays Agenda.

Bookkeeping Company: Supervisor feels we have some communication clarification to have with bookkeepers. Did not agree with bank statements being sent to the Board and Printed for the Town Board. Town clerk explained they were all in one document together the reports and bank statements and she printed for board because it was all included. Supervisor wants just reports sent to Town Board not bank Statements. Still wants some level of reporting and does not feel comfortable with the level of reporting for monthly budget.

Abstract of Claims for Prepays:

A Motion was made to approve the Pre-Paid Abstract of Claims by Councilmember Karen Roffe, and Seconded by Councilmember, Matthew Durbin. Motion carried. Ayes 5, Noes 0.

Supervisor's subjects: Last Tuesday April 4, 2023, Grant Fire Efficiency Study meeting. No Contract signed with state yet. Timelines and milestones to comply with. John Yasso is our Liaison.

Broken pipe at water tank. Russ Page said it is ordered. The supervisor is concerned with THM being higher than normal this time of year. Supervisor wants timeline on when pipe is going to arrive sooner rather than later. THM Removal System to be put back into place. Bumper blocks had been requested to be purchased and placed in the parking lot. The supervisor asked Highway Superintendent, Russ Page if this was on the list. He said no not yet. Russ Page wanted a follow-up discussion regarding the Parking Lot Project

Tree Removed from Town Hall:

A Lengthy discussion took place regarding the removal of tree after there was a Town Board Decision to have the Highway Department Staff remove the tree at February Meeting. Russ Page, Highway Superintendent asked what happened to the tree? The Supervisor said it was taken down and various reasons for removal were stated. The Highway Superintendent asked numerous times where the tree was taken because it was black walnut and may have value. The Town Supervisor stated no value it was rotted. It probably went to the dump, Supervisor continued. Town Resident, Rich Neumann spoke up that Supervisor Fanaro, went against a Town Board decision and that cannot happen. Village Resident, Dan Christiano spoke to Town Board and Supervisor of the definition and powers as a Town Board in Town Law definition of such Municipal Board.

At one point in conversation, it was brought up that tree may have even been on neighboring property and not Town property as Supervisor had called neighbor to ask permission to remove. Town Resident, Todd Lunbanski, spoke up and said, "I hope not because you cannot spend taxpayers' money on private property." Supervisor said he would pay back but it was the Towns tree. The supervisor clarified that he called the neighbor because it was on the line as instructed to get permission and of course it's on the town's property. Highway Superintendent wanted to know what communication there was with Town Board members to have tree removed, and Each Board member replied that there was no additional communication prior to tree being removed. Town Board feels there is a lack of communication happening. The supervisor stated that there is a level of insubordination on parking and not removing the tree in a timely manner.

Councilmember Matthew Durbin said wasn't contacted until tonight about the tree. If he had been he would probably agree with the Town Supervisor because he has no knowledge of trees. Councilmember Karen Roffe said maybe in future as a courtesy to the town Board and community if communication could happen, not that Supervisor has to, it might deter conversations that are happening today and make people feel better. Town Resident, Lisa Lunbanski asked for clarification because it sounded like to her that Supervisor can overturn any decision that the town Board makes. Council member Karen Roffe said no that's not what she meant. Council member Gerald Hull said he had no prior communication unless he missed an email. He would think if it was an emergency that the town Supervisor has the authority to remove. Supervisor apologizes to move forward.

THM Removal System: Supervisor wants a timeline for this and must have one because of the leaks. Highway Superintendents, Russ Page asked that the Water Department and the people that hold the certificates be consulted because they are in the water department, I am the Highway Superintendent and communicate with them regarding the schedule for working things around the duties of water department, however, have no responsibility for the Water Department as Ed Hauslauer oversees that department and we communicate daily. The Highway Superintendent and Supervisor were establishing who is in charge and when mistakes happen who is responsible for it. Jason Yasso wants to have a level of authority for tasks and control over employees, due to a chain of command. Gerald Hull is asking that maybe there needs to be a chain of command established. Checks and balance for water loss is happening once a month and Jason Molino has been helping with that and seems like a reasonable time frame according to Councilmember Gerald Hull. The supervisor asked when we have a problem how often are the meters being read? The Highway Superintendent replied we have only had the three months, and Highway Department and Water Department employee, Todd Lunbanski said we are reading water tank meter daily; however, it doesn't tell us we have a leak. The supervisor said you know how much went into the

tank, Todd Lunbanski, but we don't know how much came out of the tank. If we can't tell what came out of tank, we cannot tell we have a leak until we get the monthly report from county. Councilmember, Gerald Hull said guys have found three leaks. The supervisor spoke about a hydrant that the town fixed because it was leaking that we should not have because under warranty, we should have shut it off and contacted manufacturer. Todd Lunbanski said we were told by Ed Hauslauer to go fix hydrant, so we did. Supervisor said, "chain of command."

Adjournment: A Motion made to adjourn the Town Board Meeting at 7:20 p.m. by Councilmember, Matthew Durbin, and Seconded by Councilmember Karen Roffe. Motion carried. Ayes 5, Noes 0.
